Elder Ivy Molly Booth is the Elder of the Wakgun people of the Gurreng Gurreng Nation. Her country extends north along the Burnett River, west as far as Mundubuerra, and north to Eidsvold along the Dawes Range to Cania Gorge then east across to Miriamvale and Baffle Creek.

Ivy Booth was born at Camboon Station and removed to Taroom Aboriginal Settlement in the early 1920's, before further being removed to Woorabinda Mission on its inception in 1927. She is the only surviving original dormitory girl of Woorabinda. At Woorabinda Ivy Booth met and married her husband Clancy Booth a Boonthamurra man. Ivy Booth is a great-great grandmother of a large and extended family who resides in Rockhampton.

Ivy Molly Booth gifted the Editors of the textbook the name Yatdjuligin.


