Forum series keeps focus on mental health

Forty-seven people from the community registered for the event. Breakfast was provided and the response hopeful. The morning left participants feeling empowered to address suicide in their own neighbourhood, community and ultimately, the region.

Dual role sits nicely between Hospital in the Home and ED

It's been a big year for Dr Shruti Nagarkar; she has passed her college fellowship, and has just been appointed the Senior Medical Officer for Hospital in the Home at Rockhampton.

Dr Nagarkar works half-time in the Emergency Department, and since last week half time in HiTH, at the Community Health building in Bolsover Street. The two roles fit neatly together, and it's a win-win situation.

HiTH patients aren't sick enough to be admitted to hospital, but they still need ongoing medically supervised monitoring, usually for some form of intravenous therapy. Nurses see them in their homes daily, and Dr Nagarkar sees them as required at the clinic in the Community Health building. "It's an extension of what we do in the ED," Dr Nagarkar said. "A lot of the patients come from the ED and into the Extended Emergency Care Unit and they don't need to stay in hospital, but still need some medical treatment so it's easy for hospital staff to discuss this with me and vice versa.

"I've always been a hospital-based doctor and was doing general practice for a couple of years (halftime).

"I thought all my experience had been in a hospital and it would be a different experience to do some community care.

"There's a lot less time pressure on you at HiTH; you're able to give whatever time the patients want. "The service explores a lot of other patient-centred facets such as occupational therapy, aged care assessment team, physio,



etc; so in that sense it is quite comprehensive."

Dr Nagarkar finished her Fellowship with the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine in April 2014 after three years of hard work. She chose this rural generalist pathway because it fits into Rockhampton life well, and she's not planning on leaving, after moving here from Mumbai 6½ years ago.

"I like the town, it's a good size. It's a more relaxed pace than a big city.

"My kids, my husband and I are all happy so there is no reason to go anywhere else." Double congratulations Dr Nagarkar!



Small comforts make a big difference to cancer patients

Sometimes it's the small things that help to make a big difference – something Cancer Council Queensland doesn't overlook. People of the Banana Shire have welcomed the arrival of a new automatic folding bed, thanks to a recent donation from the charity, to help increase patient comfort and care.

Biloela Hospital was one of the local recipients of Cancer Council Queensland's 2014 Community Grants Program, launched earlier this year.

The service benefited from a \$3800 grant which has been used to purchase the bed to benefit cancer patients in the privacy of their homes.

Biloela Hospital Community Health Nurse Corina Berry said the new product would greatly assist patients and their loves ones by helping them feel more at home. "The grant has allowed us to improve quality of life for cancer sufferers at home by providing a bed that is flexible and functions as a hospital bed would, but in the comfort of their own home," Ms Berry said.

"People often want to remain at home with loved ones for as long as possible, so this bed makes caring and living at home much easier and will allow for patients and their family to remain more independent.

"It's vital to make sure the client is as comfortable as possible and remove some of the manual handling issues that carers face when people become unwell. This portable bed can create a comfort that a normal bed cannot." Cancer Council Queensland spokesperson Katie Clift said the

Product recall - HP laptop and docking station power cords

A worldwide product recall of power cords supplied with HP laptops and HP docking stations between September 2010 and June 2012, has been instigated by HP.

HSIA has been working with HP representatives to obtain replacement power cords, and has now received this stock.

If you have a HP laptop/notebook or a HP docking station, please check the power cord used with both the laptop and the docking station to ascertain if it is an item identified for recall.

How to identify a faulty power cord?

Refer to the table below and compare this to the Moulded Mark, Wrapped Label or Flagged Label identifier.

What to do if you have a recalled power cord?

Log a service request by contacting the ISC on 1800 198 175, or via the Self Service portal http://connect. health.qld.gov.au/ssc/Customerselfservice.aspx

Include the words "HP Power Cord Recall" when speaking to an ISC staff member or in the description if logging the request through the Self Service Portal.

Identify the asset number of the ICT device, eg QHxxxxxxx

Include your contact details (Name, telephone number), location of ICT device, and contact details of another person should you be rostered off.

What will happen?

Once a Service request is received, Central Queensland HSIA staff will contact you and arrange a site visit to replace the power cord identified in the product recall.

Psycho-oncology Symposium: Implementing Quality Standards in Supportive Care

Cancer Council Queensland and Griffith University are pleased to announce that Assistant Professor Mark Lazenby and Dr Bena Cartmill will be joining Professor Suzanne Chambers and Professor Joanne Aitken to share their expertise in cancer care.



Mark Lazenby, a philosopher of religion and an oncology and palliative care nurse practitioner, is a professor of nursing, divinity, and Middle East studies at Yale University. For his expertise in psychosocial distress screening and the cultural and spiritual issues in palliative care, he was elected Fellow of the American Psychosocial Oncology Society. He has commenced a National Cancer Institute-funded program to educate and support staff from cancer care facilities across the United States on implementing comprehensive psychosocial distress screening. He is co-editor of Safe Passage: A Global Spiritual Sourcebook for Care at the End of Life (Oxford University Press, 2014). His current research focuses on developing a spiritually sensitive early palliative care intervention for Muslims who are in treatment for cancer, as well as scaling up palliative care services in Botswana.

Mark Lazenby will be discussing screening for distress in oncology care.



Bena Cartmill received her PhD from the University of Queensland in the field of Speech Pathology in 2012. Her previous research has involved examining the functional outcomes of head and neck cancer patients following radiotherapy and chemotherapy treatments. She continues to work clinically in this area and conduct ongoing research in the head and neck cancer field through an Office of Medical and Health Research Fellowship.

Bena Cartmill will be discussing challenges in supportive care in head and neck cancer – the Princess Alexandra Hospital experience.



Suzanne Chambers is a health psychologist and has worked as a practitioner and researcher in psychological support for people with cancer for over 20 years. She is an Australian Research Council Future Fellow and the 2013 William Rudder Fellow. She has published extensively on the psychological effects of cancer and is currently leading large scale randomised control trials of interventions that address couple support and sexuality, lifestyle and unmet supportive care needs, and psychological distress in men with prostate cancer as well as the impacts of stigma on people with lung cancer and distress support for all people impacted by cancer.

Suzanne Chambers will be discussing implementing models of psychological care in oncology.



Joanne Aitken is Head of Research at the Cancer Council Queensland, the premier non-government cancer control organization in the state of Queensland, Australia. She is also the Director of the Queensland Cancer Registry and Director of the Australian Paediatric Cancer Registry. Joanne is a research scientist who has worked in the field of cancer epidemiology for the past 25 years. Joanne has co-authored over 175 scientific publications and sits on management and advisory groups for cancer registration, cancer in young adults, cancer clusters in Queensland and cancer service quality and safety. She is the regional representative for Oceania for the International Association of Cancer Registries.

Joanne Aitken will be discussing the work of the Cancer Council Queensland Cancer Research Centre.




