Capacity Building Stream of Poverty and Disadvantage Program – Sidney Myer Fund & The Myer Foundation

Expression of Interest close 15 January 2016

The Myer Foundation and Sidney Myer Fund Capacity Building Stream (CBS) seeks to resource community and non-profit organisations to increase their effectiveness and impact through activities that build capacity across strategic and operational domains.

Not-for-profit and community organisations working with *young people in out-of-home care* may now apply through the Poverty and Disadvantage Program for grants between \$25,000 and \$100,000 to undertake organisational strengthening programs and activities. Grants may be paid in one or two instalments, depending on size, and may be expended over up to two years.

Eligibility criteria:

- Not-for- profit and community-based organisations located and headquartered in Australia are eligible to apply
- Applicants MUST be working in this Program's single focus area
- Applicants must have annual revenue of less than \$15 million
- Applicants may be in current funding with The Myer Foundation and Sidney Myer Fund however this is not a requirement. Nor does it exclude applicants from eligibility.

Tackling Tough Times Together Round 6 - FRRR

Applications close 27 January 2016

The Tackling Tough Times Together grant program helps communities access the resources they need to support one another through the ongoing effects of the drought impacting Queensland.

Grants of up to \$20,000 are available across most of Queensland and selected shires in the New South Wales Northern Tablelands (see table below). **A small number of grants valued at up to \$50,000** are also available for larger-scale projects that have a broader impact.

Funding will support community-based activities that both help to relieve current stressors and symptoms, but most importantly, build capacity and resilience for the future.

Funds could also support activities that engage people in being active, exploring options and creating something that will stand the test of tough times.

Objectives are to:

- Enhance the mental health and wellbeing of drought-stressed rural and remote communities
- Reduce social isolation by facilitating strong social cohesion and connection
- Support and engage the community in leadership development and skills training

Eligibility:

Communities must be in a drought affected area (see below for full list)



• Groups that are planning a project for broad community benefit – 'charitable purpose'

- Priority will be given to organisations run by and based in the regions over those delivering services to, but not based in the listed regions
- Projects led by local communities will also be given preference
- Groups with outstanding final reports are not eligible to apply unless a time extension has been granted
- They encourage groups to complete their final reports so that they can then apply
- Groups must be located in one of the 49 Queensland areas listed on the website

Cycling Infrastructure Grants – Department of Transport and Main Roads

Applications close 29 January 2016

The Cycle Network Local Government Grants Program helps local governments to deliver best practice, high quality and safe cycling infrastructure and facilities. Local governments that have formally endorsed their region's Principal Cycle Network Plan are eligible to apply for a 50% grant for the design and/or construction of cycling infrastructure that contributes to the delivery of their regional cycle network.

Eligible projects

Projects eligible for this funding include the detailed design and/or construction of:

- on-road bike lanes
- off-road bikeways/veloways
- off-road shared paths
- bridges and underpasses
- bicycle crossing provisions
- mid-trip and end-of-trip facilities
- directional and route signage.

Cultural Infrastructure Grants – Cairns Regional Council

Applications close 29 January 2016

These grants provide financial assistance to cultural organisations that wish to pursue building or material enhancements for their premises. Specifically the purpose of the grants is to:

- Enhance the organisation's capacity to provide ongoing services through improved building works;
- Improve the capacity and wellbeing of cultural groups; and
- Increase community participation in cultural activities.

For the purposes of this grant, cultural organisations means - an entity that controls and operates a building or premises in which it programs a wide range of arts and cultural events and activities for the purpose of:

- Enabling Cairns residents and groups to present local community and cultural events: and
- Providing popular entertainment and culturally enriching events and experiences for residents and visitors to the region.

Assistance will be in the form of either:

- A cash payment to the organisation, or
- Advice on alternative means of securing appropriate funds. Council may be willing to provide a guarantee in line with Council's Bank Guarantee Policy.
- The minimum amount per application is \$1,000; the maximum amount per application is \$50,000.
- Council will favour applicants that are offering matching funding.

Applicants must:

- Be an entity that carries on activities for a public purpose; or another entity whose primary objective is not directed at making a profit
- Be of a cultural or performing arts nature, not a sporting or other community group
- Have security of tenure over their land, either freehold or with a long-term lease
- Provide Council with relevant Project Plan, financial statements, invoices, quotes as determined necessary by Council officers, based on the nature of the project to be funded
- Projects to be completed within 12 months of the approval date.

Partnering for Scale and Impact – SSE Australia

Closing date extended to 5 February 2016

SSE Australia has brought Partnering for Scale & Impact (PSI) together to provide resources too often unavailable to those in start-up and scale-up mode in the social enterprise sector. PSI funding is generally going to be for those with Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status. PSI Series 1 will award \$25,000-\$100,000 per annum, on this basis, for three years to a successful applicant/s ("PSI Ventures") packaged with a network of support and opportunity.

Subsequent PSI Series will seek to support non-DGR status entities, which are invited to express interest via an application now.

A PSI Venture will benefit from the wisdom and knowledge of community leaders. This group of committed volunteers are known as PSI Advisors and will bolster the resources leaders of social start-ups have access to. Each PSI Venture will have three to five permanent advisors for their term of engagement with PSI. The specific construction of the group will depend on the type of help and knowledge the venture needs. It is fundamental to the design of PSI that PSI Advisors are welcomed and sought by applicants.

A PSI Venture will be provided money from PSI based on an agreed business plan and capital allocation over the three years. PSI Advisors will play two key roles: they are to support to the startup leader and management team, and; will oversee, to ensure the PSI funds are allocated and spent according to an agreed business plan. A deviation from that pre-agreed plan is possible, but only with the agreement of the PSI Advisors.

PSI is designed to decrease the risk of failure due to lack of financial resources, access to business acumen, networks, knowledge and experience. It facilitates a strong engagement between social entrepreneurs and leaders from business, philanthropic, industry, professional services and commercial sectors. PSI will reconnect communities to make them work better.

Ventures must meet the following broad criteria:

- Your venture tackles a clearly identifiable social problem with a scalable and disruptive business solution.
- 2. Your venture is ideally more than two to three years old with a turnover of no more than \$1.5 \$2 million per annum.
- 3. You know what you'll do with some money and have a plan to grow your business and scale your mission.
- 4. Your business plan and revenue model is for a business that trades in a marketplace. PSI will not fund programs.
- 5. You need to show evidence of performance to date, a thorough understanding of your marketplace and mission, have realistic and defendable key assumptions, commitment, management and leadership ability and a plan to grow.

Funding is available for eligible organisations to fund projects to install security-related infrastructure or remove environmental characteristics (such as a lack of lighting or poor natural surveillance) that facilitate street crime in local retail, entertainment and commercial precincts or public parks that have been identified as experiencing problems with criminal or anti-social behaviour.

The number of grants awarded in each stream will depend upon the number of eligible applications that satisfactorily address the selection criteria and the amount of funding sought. There is a limit of one application per organisation. **No limit is mentioned in the guidelines**, however Round Two of the Safer Streets Programme will provide up to \$29.4 million for projects that address the objectives of the programme.

To be eligible for funding under stream 1, the applicant organisation must be either:

- a local government organisation; or
- a not for profit organisation as defined by the Australian Taxation Office* that is also incorporated in Australia.

Indigenous Enterprise Development (IED) funding will support the establishment of sustainable Indigenous enterprises. Grants will typically be between \$5,000 and \$500,000. Under the Indigenous Advancement Strategy (IAS), the Australian Government will provide \$30 million a year to support the establishment or expansion of Indigenous enterprises across Australia. This includes a \$25 million commitment for enterprises in remote Australia as part of its reforms to remote employment services under the Community Development Programme.

IED funding aims to address the barriers faced by Indigenous businesses and to encourage commercially sustainable businesses to start up or expand. Growing Indigenous businesses will increase Indigenous wealth and employment, and promote economic development, especially in remote Australia.

They will accept Applications from entrepreneurs and enterprises at <u>all stages</u> of development, from start-up to expansion. This includes:

- Entrepreneurs with a great business idea who need support to develop their ideas into a business proposal;
- Entrepreneurs who have done a lot of ground-work and are looking for seed/start-up capital and/or business advice to start a business;
- Established enterprises that have identified an opportunity to expand and require finance and/or business support; and
- Established enterprises that need business support services or mentoring to solve a specific problem or issue.
